To submit to the electors of the City of Portsmouth, Ohio at the next Creneral Election to be held on the 2nd day of November 2021, the question of whether or not to adopt a Wholesale Electricity Purchase/Renewable Energy Program.

Whereas, at the February 8, 2021 City Managers Conference Agenda renewable energy was discussed. From the discussion it was decided to move forward with asking the citizens of the City of Portsmouth by vote in the 2021 General Election if they would like to move forward with essentially pulling together the buying power of the residents of Portsmouth to obtain more wholesale pricing on the electricity that they use as well as getting cleaner energy options. Similar programs have been adopted in Chillicothe and Athens. If approved by the votes in November future legislation will be needed; and

Immediately below such top line shall be printed the words "Proposed Question of whether or not to adopt a Wholesale Electricity Purchase/Renewable Energy Program" followed by the words "A majority vote is necessary for passage."

Immediately below such brief title and statement of the percentage of affirmative votes required for passage, shall be printed a condensed text of the issue. The condensed text to be printed upon the ballot shall be as follows:

"Whether or not to adopt a Wholesale Electricity Purchase/Renewable Energy Program."

Immediately below the ballot title or printed condensed text of the issue shall appear the following, one above the other, in the order indicated:

FOR THE WHOLESALE ELECTRICITY PURCHASE/RENEWABLE ENERGY PROGRAM

AGAINST THE WHOLESALE ELECTRICITY PURCHASE/RENEWABLE ENERGY PROGRAM

Adjacent to each proposition, there shall be a method by which the elector may vote for or ugainst the proposed issue, as provided on the Computer Election Systems.

SECTION IV. That the City Clerk be and she hereby is directed forthwith to certify a copy of this ordinance to the Board of Elections of Scioto County, Ohio.

SECTION V. The City Clerk of the City of Portsmouth. Ohio is hereby authorized and directed to publish the within ordinance by posting a true and authenticated copy thereof on the bulletin board in the lobby of the second floor of the Municipal Building located at 728 Second Street in the City of Portsmouth, for a period of not less than fifteen (15) days.

#### ORDINANCE

Year - 2021 Number 51

An ordinance authorizing all actions necessary to effect an opt-out electric service aggregation program pursuant to Section 4928.20, Ohio revised code, directing the city to submit a ballot question to the electors and repealing Ordinance No. 22 passed April 12, 2021. Pursuant to council rule 5, this legislation is requested to be passed as an emergency in accordance with section 10 of the charter for the city of Portsmouth in order to facilitate administration, daily operation and avoid practical and legal entanglements.

Whereas, under Section 4928.20, Ohio Revised Code, the City of Portsmouth, Ohio (the "City") is authorized to establish an opt-out electric aggregation program for the benefit of electric consumers located within the incorporated areas of the City; and

Whereas, under Section 4928.20, Ohio Revised Code, the City may exercise such authority jointly with other political subdivisions in the State of Ohio; and

Whereas, governmental aggregation provides an opportunity for electricity consumers collectively to participate in the potential benefits of electricity deregulation through lower electric rates which they would not otherwise be able to have individually. Now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE City Council of the City of Portsmouth, Ohio:

SECTION I. This City Council finds and determines that it is in the best interest of the City and certain electric consumers located within the incorporated areas of the City to establish an opt-out electric aggregation program (the "Electric Aggregation Program"). Provided that this Ordinance and the Electric Aggregation Program is approved by the electors of the City pursuant to Section 2 of this Ordinance, the City is hereby authorized to aggregate, in accordance with Section 4928.20. Ohio Revised Code, the retail electric loads located within the incorporated areas of the City. For the Electric Aggregation Program, the City may enter into service agreements to facilitate the sale and purchase of service for retail electric loads. The City may exercise such authority jointly with any other political subdivision of the State of Ohio to the full extent permitted by law. The aggregation will occur automatically for each person owning, occupying, controlling or using an electric load center proposed to be aggregated and will provide for the opt-out rights described in Section 3 of this Ordinance.

SECTION II. The Board of Elections of Scioto County is hereby directed to submit the following question to the electors of the City at the general election on November 2, 2021 at the regular voting places withing the City of Portsmouth, Ohio, between the hours prescribed by law:

Shall the City of Portsmouth have the authority to aggregate the retail electricity loads located within the incorporated areas of the City and enter into service agreements for the sale and purchase of electricity, such aggregation to occur automatically except where any person elects to opt out?

SECTION III. That the ballot used for the voting on said proposed question shall have printed across the top thereof and below the stub the words "OFFICIAL QUESTION AND ISSUE BALLOT."

The printed matter pertaining to this issue on the ballot shall be enclosed at the top and bottom thereof by a heavy horizontal line across the width of the ballot, Immediately below such top line shall be printed the words: "Shall the City of Portsmouth have the authority to aggregate the retail electricity loads located within the incorporated areas of the City and enter into service agreements for the sale and purchase of electricity, such aggregation to occur automatically except where any person elects to opt out?" followed by the words "A majority vote is necessary for passage."

Immediately below such brief title and statement of the percentage of affirmative votes required for passage, shall be printed a condensed text of the issue. The condensed text to be printed upon the ballot shall be as follows:

"Shall the City of Portsmouth have the authority to aggregate the retail electricity loads located within the incorporated areas of the City and enter into service agreements for the sale and purchase of electricity, such aggregation to occur automatically except where any person elects to opt out"

Immediately below the ballot title or printed condensed text of the issue shall appear the following, one above the other, in the order indicated:

Adjacent to each proposition, there shall be a method by which the elector may vote for or against the proposed issue, as provided on the Computer Election Systems.

SECTION IV. The Clerk of this Council is instructed to file a certified copy of this Ordinance and the proposed form of the ballot question with the Scioto County Board of Elections not later than August 4, 2021, which is at least ninety (90) days prior to November 2, 2021. Ordinance No. 22 passed April 12, 2021 is hereby repealed. The Electric Aggregation Program shall not take effect unless approved by a majority of the electors voting upon the proposed ballot question at the election held pursuant to this Section 2 and Section 4928.20. Ohio Revised Code.

SECTION V. Upon the approval of a majority of the electors voting at the general election provided for in Section 2 of this Ordinance, the City shall develop a plan of operation and governance for the Electricity Aggregation Program (the "Plan"). Before adopting such Plan, the City shall hold at least two public hearings on the Plan. Before the first hearing, notice of the hearings shall be published once a week for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City. The notice shall summarize the Plan and state the date, time, and location of each hearing. The disclosure shall state prominently the rates, charges, and other terms and

conditions of enrollment. The stated procedure shall allow any person enrolled in the Electricity Aggregation Program the opportunity to opt-out of the program every three years, without paying a switching fee. Any such person that opts out of the Electricity Aggregation Program pursuant to the stated procedure shall default to the standard service offer provided under division (a) of Section 4928.14 or division (d) of Section 4928.35 Ohio Revised Code, until the person chooses an alternative supplier.

SECTION VI. The City Clerk of the City of Portsmouth, Ohio is hereby authorized and directed to publish the within ordinance by posting a true and authenticated copy thereof on the bulletin board in the lobby of the second floor of the Municipal Building located at 728 Second Street in the City of Portsmouth, for a period of not less than fifteen (15) days.

SECTION VII. This ordinance was passed and all actions and deliberations of the Council relating thereto were conducted in meetings open to the public pursuant to Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

SECTION VIII. This Ordinance passed as an emergency measure shall be in force and effect from and after its passage.
